Angels of Mercy and Ambulance Drivers: American Women Volunteers in World War I

Even before the United States entered the Great War in April 1917, many American women had volunteered to help the allied cause. Not allowed to become part of the army medical staff, women physicians established the American Women's Hospital in northern France while thousands of nurses worked with volunteer organizations or with the Army Nurse Corps. Many stayed on after 1918 to help in the rebuilding of northern France. Among them were writers such as Edith Wharton and Gertrude Stein, dancer Loie Fuller, and daughters of America's wealthiest families including Anne Morgan, Helen Astor, Eleanor Alexander-Roosevelt, and Anne Vanderbilt. This course recounts the fascinating story of American women's volunteer work in France during the hostilities and the reconstruction that followed.

The risk for diabetes is statistically high for each American and getting higher each year, while increasing with age. And the complications can be severe. Numerous studies have shown that lifestyle changes can reduce this risk. But what are those lifestyle changes and how can we effectively implement them? Art and the Power of Cross-Cultural Exchange: Andrew Wyeth and Robert Rauschenberg go to China

0.2 ceus

In the 1980's two American artists had a surprising impact on Chinese culture. Young Chinese artists, in a movement that became known as Wyethiana, embraced Andrew Wyeth's figurative narrative paintings. During the same decade Robert Rauschenberg's project, Rauschenberg Overseas Cultural Interchange (ROCI), went to China. Rauschenberg's self-produced project introduced his controversial, contemporary art making methods to eager young artists, who were looking for ways to express themselves beyond the figure. These two incidents of spontaneous exchange were without political intention or intervention, and speak to the power of art as communicator. This presentation introduces participants to these rarely discussed exchanges of the art of Andrew Wyeth and Robert Rauschenberg, which impacted generations of art makers and audiences across cultures.

Shakespeare for Beginners and Experts, Part III

1.2 ceus

William Shakespeare is widely regarded as the greatest author of plays and poems in the English language. What is not widely recognized is that he wrote for two audiences: one was playgoers eager for diversion and entertainment; the other were those thoughtful "wiser sort" who, like many of us, were deeply concerned with the political, cultural, religious and social questions of the day. Shakespeare had a lot to say to both audiences which, in good part, accounts for his timeless popularity. In this course, we read four plays and sonnets, and discuss them as well-informed lovers of the theater and poetry. But we also sift his writings for the provocative ideas—seditious, ungodly and rebellious ideas—that fired the imagination of the "wiser sort" in Shakespeare's time and now. We read the following plays: *The Taming of the Shrew*, *The Tempest*, *Loves' Labors Lost*, *The Merry Wives of Windsor*; as well as Shakespeare's *Sonnets*.

The Emergence of the United States as a World Power

At the end of the 19th century, the United States was forced to reposition itself globally or watch its exporters get squeezed out of essential European and Asian markets. Over the next few years, the U.S. transformed from a growing but isolated and self-contained economic backwater into the world's leading manufacturer and a full partner in a new Anglo-American alliance that would dominate world politics for the next century. This course utilizes contemporary accounts, including Admiral Hyman Rickover's *How the Battleship Maine Was Destroyed* (1976), as well as information derived from historical documents discovered and released as recently as 2002, to determine how this quantum shift in American foreign policy occurred.

The Modern Short Story: An International Perspective, Part 3

1.6 ceus

A continuation of the past two summers' reading and discussion of short stories by a wide variety of international writers. The suggested text is the distinguished, highly regarded poet/editor Daniel Halpern's classic collection, *The Art of the Tale: An International Anthology of Short Stories*. Writers from 21 countries offer stories that are sad, happy, wistful, poignant, satirical, disturbing, and humorous; yet underscore the complex circumstances and multiple vagaries of the human condition. Included are familiar names—Achebe, Carver, Borges, Mahfuz, and Oates, but also others one may encounter for the first time—Tommaso Landolfi (Italy), Wolfgang Borchert (Germany), Abdelslam Boulaich (Morocco), and Mercégrave; Rodoreda (Spain); offering an opportunity to expand one's literary horizons. Themes include loss, alienation, feminism, family dysfunction, political displacement, exile, sexual awakening, and others. There will be a field trip to an ethnic restaurant, chosen by the class, which complements some of the readings, allowing students to allow to socialize and network outside the classroom.

More than one in three adults in the US have prediabetes, which is characterized by higher than normal blood sugar levels. Nine out of ten don't know they have it. Some are morbidly obese, some are rail thin. Untreated, 15-30% of people with prediabetes develop type 2 diabetes as well as an increased risk of serious health complications including vision loss, heart disease, stroke, kidney failure, amputation of toes, feet or legs, and premature death. This course discusses lifestyle changes to decrease one's risk profile and specific approaches that seniors can easily utilize for changing negative habits to increase longevity and improve health.
